The Seven Generations Child and Family Counseling Services were developed to meet the growing mental health needs of American Indian children and their families in Los Angeles County.

Behavioral Health Services

Seven Generations serves a unique function in helping the Los Angeles American Indian children and their families to build on strengths for promoting harmony and healing by providing cultural, spiritual, comprehensive, and accessible community services with inter-tribal respect.

The program provides an array of services including:

- Individual, family and group therapy and parent education classes
- Child mental health services
- Crisis intervention
- Access to medication support
- Case management services
- Referral/access to services outside of UAII as needed
- Calworks Program

SAMHSA- CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH INITIATIVE

A 6-year grant to establish a full array of mental health and support services organized into a coordinated network. The System of Care intends to meet the unique clinical and functional needs of each American Indian child and family in Los Angeles County referred to our program.

NATIVE PATHWAYS TO HEALING

This program provides services for American Indians who have been victims of child abuse as well as children and who have been victims of domestic violence and/or sexual assault and is funded through the Office of Emergency Services.

Central High School is a culturally sensitive educational program for American Indian high school youth who are in need of an alternative program to complete high school. The program provides coursework and academic testing required by LAUSD to earn a high school diploma. Regular hours of instruction are 8am to 1pm, Monday through Friday. To be considered for enrollment, students should be at least 16 years of age and may be older than 18 years of age. The school also provides placement assistance for students to attend after school and Saturday classes at nearby academic and career training institutions.

- College and Career Placement including GED and ROP programs
- Work Experience and Service Learning • Independent Study
- Job Readiness placement & assistance
- Cultural enrichment programs for our youth and their families.

The Health Project was designed and implemented in 1996 to enhance the health and well being of the American Indian community in Metropolitan Los Angeles. The Health Project provides public health services and access to free & low cost quality health care. The primary program services are comprehensive case-management, public health nursing, providing access to health services and prevention education.

The scope of public health nursing services includes:

- Health screening and risk assessments by a Public Health Nurse
- Education and prevention programs for hypertension, diabetes, obesity and HIV Prevention.
- Screening and access for child immunizations, tuberculosis screening and flu shots for adults/high risk clients.

Access to Primary Care and Specialty Care:

- The Health Project has established agreements with various community clinics and providers for medical, dental and specialty care. The Case Management staff works with each client to determine their needs and the most appropriate location for services.

Culturally Sensitive services for the American Indian Community

- American Indian case managers who serve as liaisons between the patients and the physicians. The case managers advocate for and address cultural issues.

- Los Angeles American Indian Clinic provides primary health care by appointment or walk-in

Primary Care Clinic Services

- The clinic provides general health care services, diagnosis and treatment of uncomplicated diseases with no apparent serious, life-threatening conditions
- Services include: Physicals, Immunizations Management of medications, treatment for infections(i.e. respiratory & skin), STD/STI screening, Lab screening (i.e. glucose, cholesterol, etc.)
- Women's Health Services include pap smears and follow-up, pregnancy testing, breast exams, and contraception prescriptions

The goal of the Robert Sundance Family Wellness Center programs is to provide community healing and wellness for generations to come. Through its multiple programs the Robert Sundance Family Wellness Center address the unique emotional, mental, spiritual, cultural, social, and physical needs of those American Indians and their families especially those dealing with recovery from substance abuse and mental health issues.

Support Services Include:

- Individual, couples, group counseling and self-help groups
- Vocational rehabilitation and social services • Proposition 36
- Access to medical and dental services • Transportation
- Cultural and spiritual activities and traditional healing practices
- Programs and community events for seniors/elders
- Nutrition and food programs
- Access to residential treatment, medical detox, and sober living and a Public Health Nurse complete an intake evaluation on individuals to ensure that each client's needs are being met.

SAMHSA- YOUTH SUICIDE PREVENTION AND EARLY INTERVENTION

The Red Hawk Project is a 3-year grant which targets American Indian and Alaska Native children, youth and young adults, ages 10-24, in Los Angeles County. The mission of the Red Hawk Project is to support youth in the development of overall wellness that recognizes the resiliency and strength of the American Indian community. The project promotes strengthening existing services at UAI by providing culturally and linguistically appropriate youth suicide prevention and early intervention services.

STRENGTHENING AMERICAN INDIAN FAMILIES (SAIF) PROJECT

- A program to educate American Indian families, couples, youth, and agencies on building healthy relationships.
- Workshops and intensive couple sessions are designed to improve family communication skills.
- Couples who complete the project will be invited to serve as mentors for other families in developing family support systems.

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICES/ADMINISTRATION FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES DOMESTIC VIOLENCE DEMONSTRATION PROJECT

The goals of this grant are to increase the number of screenings for domestic violence and intimate partner violence among American Indian/Alaska Native female clients ages 15-40, and to improve the agency's response to the prevention and intervention of domestic violence and intimate partner violence.

The Workforce Development Program provides opportunities for American Indian persons to learn and develop necessary skills to achieve complete self-sufficiency in the job market.

This program provides services to American Indian men and women seeking employment and/or advancement in the job market. Services include: vocational assessment, academic evaluation, classroom training, occupational skills training, GED preparation, job readiness training, job club, job coaching, and career development.

The mission of the American Indian Clubhouse is to provide services that enhance the growth and well-being of American Indian youth in Los Angeles in a manner that is respectful to cultural and tribal values. The Clubhouse offers an after-school enrichment program and weekend activities to Los Angeles area youth, ages 5-17.

Clubhouse services for youth include:

- Tutoring and educational activities and opportunities
- Team sports and recreational activities in conjunction with healthy nutrition practices
- Summer youth camps for all ages, and winter camps for teens
- American Indian cultural activities and field trips
- Peer workshops that develop self-esteem, confidence, and job skills
- Prevention and awareness activities that deal with substance/tobacco abuse and teen pregnancy
